Bet if they had been white congregations they wouldn't have turned back any yellow goods. Your white man is on the make, and never questions whether the money is bloody or not.

If you had a case in court would you want to take the advice of the attorney on the opposite side? Well, isn't that just the condition in the case of these and all the other prominent papers? Do a little thinking in your own interest.

EVERYBODY knows that less than a dozen men run the senate and that these men, with one or two exceptions, are owned by corporations. On the collars of most of the leaders of the United States senate is the invisible inscription—"Corporation limited—my dog."—Omaha News.

THE government is paying national banks interest on \$530,000,000 on government bonds which the government had paid. Not one citizen out of a hundred knows it.

To pay \$800,000 for other people to spend must be a great thing indeed! When I skin my neighbor it helps him wonderfully! Really, could we have any potatoes if there were no potato bugs?

IN thirty years the use of the post-office for packages has been increased in charges one hundred per cent, just to force the people to use the private express companies. We have the worst postal system of any civilized nation. In Europe you can send twenty-two pounds by post, anywhere, for 25 cents, in this country the cost is \$3.52! Just to make the Platts rich.

"WHAT earthly use is there for a postal savings bank in this country?" asks the Long Beach Press, of California. O, none at all. The people don't want them. They prefer to have banks like the defunct Provident that just scooped a million from the poor in New York, and others that have stolen many millions from the poor during the last decade. Sure enough, what do the people need with postal savings banks? Who so silly as to ask?

THE Lawrence, Kan., World says that Kansas has \$80 in bank for each man, woman and child. The editor is dreamy. There is not ten cents in actual cash in all the Kansas banks for each dollar they owe. It is simply a bunco game. They are drawing interest on money that has no existence—except in the ignorance or imagination of such men as edit the World. Socialism will make this exactly the opposite—there will always be as much money in banks as the banks owe the people. You bet.

St. JOHN'S cathedral, New York, will cost \$10,000,000 when completed. And tens of thousands of people who live there never have enough to eat, and their children go hungry to school. Of course that is the way the Chris' would have done it! He would starve children and put millions into vain, showy buildings and big salaried preachers! And the people wonder why the poor don't have faith in the churches. Only criminals could waste money in show and let the people starve. But the churches of today are simply clubs, where the swells go to show off their finery.

THE Arena is a magazine that is always worth reading. If you have not read it of late you are missing some literature that broadens the mind and leaves you greater than you were. You Watson's Magazine is another that, while not Socialistic, is teaching many things that the people ought to know. Dealing with live questions, Tom treats them in a way peculiar to himself, and his historical reading is not such as the school books are permitted to print. While other magazines have an occasional article along radical lines, these magazines are all radical. The Arena is published at Trenton, N. J., and Watson's at 121 W. 4th, New York.

THE new "ASSET" CURRENCY. Do you know what "asset currency" which the bankers are demanding, means? It means that they can deposit their individual stocks and railroad and other bonds with the government and draw the amount in new bank notes! All they will have to do to get money is to organize new corporations, issue hundreds of millions of stocks and bonds on them, deposit these pieces of paper and draw the cash—and let the government hold the bag. Talk about the John Laws bubble that burst Europe in the last century—this would throw it in the shade. When the common people want money they have to put up their farms or houses for security, but when the rich thieves want money they will have only to print a few pieces of paper and the government will print and hand them over the money, like it does now on government bonds. Wonder what has become of the gold standard? Give the robbers rope enough and, perhaps, they will hang themselves.

Wake up! Are you going to sleep your liberties away, as did the Romans, the Greeks, and the other nations of the past? Your national house is on fire! Wake up!

We can secure the instant derision of the secretary of commerce and labor, Mr. Metcalf, and the commissioner of corporations, Mr. Garfield. If you persist in us in the slightest degree you will be out of your job, if you keep at the business you will find what we say is absolutely true. Rockefeller is a bigger man than Roosevelt."

THEN AND NOW.

When William Lloyd Garrison denounced chattel slavery he was mobbed and nearly lynched. Today all he stood for is enacted into law and taken as a matter of course.

When Copernicus told the people that the earth was a round globe he was denounced, maligned, dammed and made to recant.

Today the whole world of people accept his discoveries as a matter of course, and as if they had never been questioned.

When the French communists wanted a popular government a century ago, the world stood aghast at their pretensions, and they were shot like coyotes.

Today, what they demanded is enjoyed in France, as though no other condition had ever existed.

When Stephenson claimed that he could make a wagon run itself without horses he was considered a dreaming fool, and was the laughing stock of the world.

Today, hundreds of millions ride on railroads and never even think that anybody ever questioned the practicability of railroads.

When the working class demanded free schools in this country less than a century ago, the demand was considered treason, and an effort to confiscate the property owners of their possessions.

Today, untold millions send their children to free schools, and are ignorant of the fact that these schools were once denounced as being treasonable and a crime against the wealth of the nation.

A few years ago electric lights were the wonder of the earth, but were considered too expensive for any practical use.

Today, they are universally used, and nothing is thought about it. They're taken as a matter of course.

Go back into history and you will find that pretty much everything we have today was at one time decried and considered a crime, and its suppression sought.

If you want to know the future of Socialism, just look back and see the triumphs of the other new thoughts, and you'll have it. Today Socialism is decried. Tomorrow it will be accepted as a matter of course, and millions will not even stop to think that it was not always as they find it. And this is the way the world learns—this is evolution.
